October 11, 2010**

Meeting was called to order at 7:00 pm at the LWA Meeting Room. Present: President Paul Ellison, Secretary Judy Thaxton, Treasurer Randy Blaich, Asst. Treasurer Rick McMahan, Matt Brueggemann, Bill Hapner, and Gerald Estes. Also present were Manager Kevin Thorpe, Office Manager Tammy Moore, Board Recorder Daphne Brunett, Deputy Kevin Caplinger and 13 visitors. Absent: Vice-President Deron McEldowney and Amy Gilbert.

President's Remarks: Mr. Ellison noted Deron McEldowney was absent due to a back injury.

10-10-153 Randy Blaich made the motion to approve the September 27, 2010 Regular Open Board minutes and the October 1,

2010 Special Meeting minutes. Bill Hapner seconded. Motion approved.

LWA Report: Roger Riga reported no problems accepting the leachate. They are reviewing and upgrading monitoring programs to prevent any problems. Items being looked at include such things as insuring the lines are correct with the help of a camera inspection, increasing the number of inspections along the lift station route, and updating the emergency response plan. Leachate test results will be published in the Viking.

Manager's Report: Patching on the dam went well. Three different kinds of repair were used:

1. Dug out rock, put rock back, then asphalted over.

2. Dug out blacktop and put blacktop back in hole only.

3. The two final places we patched got skim coat only.

The bees have been moved from the Lodge to the Maintenance barn area. The leaf vac is working fine, but the motor in the truck is cracking and pop-

ping. It has been a burnt valve for a few years now.

The audit report is in the packets for review. During the OLCA meeting, it was mentioned some Lake Communities have full audits every two or three years. Lakengren has one every year. The cost of doing it annually is no more expensive than doing it every two or three years.

Sandra Comer will be here Wednesday to inspect the LWM accounts receivable and accounts payable companies Tammy set up to ensure that they have all the necessary information needed.

The aeration system for Valhalla lake is installed and running.

COMMITTEE REPORTS

Policy Review Committee-The committee met October 5th. They discussed the changes that were made to the Policy and Procedures Manual Standards and made final corrects to it which will be presented to the Board this evening. Also discussed was the request for a Noise Ordinance. A first draft is in the works. The next meeting is November 2, 2010 at 7:00 pm.

Viking Editorial Committee-November 15th is the deadline.

Using Capital Improvements funds for a Security truck was discussed. Mr. Thorpe was asked to look into prices.

The catered dinner by Charlotte's Catering of Eaton consisted of chicken or beef, potatoes, vegetables, salad and dessert. President John Kirkman was emcee for the evening. Boy Scouts from Eaton and West Alexandria gave a patriotic tribute to the crowd by presenting a flag ceremony. Then Todd Appledorn was introduced. He spoke briefly of his personal service and the history of the Eaton Armory that will be relocating to Piqua by next spring. He told at length about the "castle-like" structure on East Main Street that was built in 1911. The move of the 1487th Transportation Company is necessitated by the lead paint within the building and the lack of space necessary for expansion. 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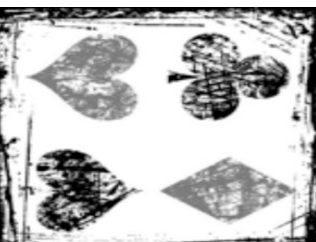

This month's review of recipes from the Lakengren Cookbook got me away from the sweets for a while. Most of these recipes are just in time for the holidays when you might need an appetizer or an extra side dish. Boy, I'm going to have to work a lot harder at Zumba to counter all the desserts I tried last month. And that on top of all the desserts to come in the next 6 weeks or so!

First on the list was the Buffalo Chicken Dip. The combination of cream cheese, cheddar cheese, ranch dressing, and hot sauce sounds weird, but I could have eaten it with a spoon! The addition of the chicken makes it taste like a quesadilla without the tortilla shells. This recipe was prepared at two of our Ohio State football game parties. It is definitely a keeper. Served warm from a crock pot just begs for a tailgate party item, but at the same time, a great go to comfort food type appetizer.

I was allowed to set up a table at the Gasper Township Spaghetti Dinner fundraiser to sell cookbooks in October, and I had a great time doing that. What surprised me the most was that the people who came in and said that they had already purchased a book commented on Jean Armour's Marinated Pretzel recipe. It wasn't just one person, or two, but several people had tried it and said it was great! Ok, this is a must try for me. My curiosity was peaked by their remarks. And they were right. I fixed the recipe but cut the portions in half, because it does make quite a bit. I tried a couple of pretzels, and thought to myself, "Ok, these are pretty good." But then I found myself going back for a couple more. And then a couple more. It's like the chip commercial. Once you start eating them, you can't stop. It's amazing; the pretzels don't get soggy while marinating in the oil, garlic and seasoning mixture. I only marinated it for three hours because of time constraints, and had to shoo away my husband a couple of times, because he was eating them out of the bowl while they were soaking. I explained to him that they had to be baked first, and he said, "but they taste good like this!" They were worth the wait.

Jack Tobias submitted a recipe for Olive Nut Spread that ended up being my lunch two days in a row it was so good. If you like olives, you will love this spread. It is so easy to prepare, and these are ingredients you probably already have on hand.

No doubt with the arrival of cold weather, we'll all be making pots of soup to warm us up. And a great one to start with is Taco Soup. This is another one of those recipes that I will be making frequently, because it is so-o-o-o good! It warms you down to your toes! It calls for fat free Hidden Valley Ranch Mix. Get real...Go ahead and use the original. I did. This is even better the next day. Serve it with big thick slices of buttered French bread and a salad for a great meal that will satisfy you for hours.

I do hope those of you who have a copy of the cookbook used JoAnn Hoffman's recipe for German Turkey Filling at Thanksgiving, printed in the "This and That" section. What a hoot! Another appropriate name for this would be "Turbo Turkey."

While working at the guardhouse last weekend, Paul Bake drove up to the gate, and stopped to show me that his arm was in a sling and support. He said the elephant had stepped on his arm while trying his recipe for Elephant Stew. He is recovering nicely. Those of you who don't have a book yet, will just have to get one to get the details of these references.

I ordered only 300 copies of the cookbook, and we have sold a little over 200 so far. My advice to you is that if you are going to get a copy, do it soon, before they are sold out and you miss your opportunity. Don't forget, these are keepsake cookbooks with the history of Lakengren as well as great pictures from around the community. They will make wonderful Christmas gifts. Treat yourself to one, too. Have a wonderful holiday season trying out some of these delicious recipes!

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A Tree for the Birds

The internet is abuzz with plans to celebrate the 500th anniversary of the first decorated Christmas tree. According to the National Christmas Tree Association and the Christmas Archives International in the United Kingdom, in December 1510, the Blackhead Fraternities of Tallinn, Estonia and Riga, Latvia of the former Soviet Union cut a tree from the forest and placed it in the town square. Paper flowers decorated that first tree, not candles as some legends proclaim, but at the end, the tree was taken down and burnt on a bonfire, steins raised in a toast to a prosperous new year. Not much more is known about that first decorated tree except that it was the inspiration of and attended by men wearing black hats. Related fraternities, other towns and churches eventually picked up the idea so that today, the town square Christmas tree is a tradition from Riga, Latvia to Paris, France to Washington, D.C. to Eaton, Ohio.

Decorating a tree to feed the winter birds goes back centuries as well, to the late 16th century also in northern Europe when a church decided to forego the paper flowers and burning end to the tree. Instead, the congregation decorated a live tree in the churchyard to honor the birds and beasts of the Nativity. They adorned the branches with nuts and berries and piled hay on the ground underneath for the deer. (George H. Harrison, *A Birds' Christmas Tree*) How about including such a tree in your family activities this season? Celebrate the 500th anniversary of that first outdoor decorated tree by decorating a tree for the birds!

Of course, an evergreen tree is most traditional, but in the spirit of Charlie Brown, a small shrub or the bare branches of a deciduous tree will work as well; whatever happens to be in your yard. If you haven't a live shrub or tree to decorate, you could wait to recycle your indoor tree until spring. Move it outside after the holidays, prop it up against the side of the house or garage or tie it to a fence as a windbreak for you and added shelter for the birds. A tree decorated for the birds helps them survive the winter, entertains bird watchers and would bring an ancient, hallowed tradition into your holiday celebration this year for the 500th anniversary. Oh, and best of all, it is easy, inexpensive and a fun project to occupy children off from school!

Some families use Christmas Eve Day assigning the children to making garlands and ornaments for the birds while mom is busy in the kitchen. They hang the decorations just before leaving for the Christmas Eve candlelight service. That way, the birds wake up Christmas morning to their own special treat. Other families use the time between Christmas and New Year's Day starting the New Year with the indoor tree recycled outside for the birds.

There are many possible edible ingredients to use for the birds.

- cranberries, grapes, apples, raisins or any dried fruit

Many fruit loving birds have flown south but Cedar Waxwings and Robins are still here and the finches will partake as well. Of course, birds love cherries too. One Lakengren lady confessed that she felt so sorry for a Robin in her yard in the snow last year that she thawed and put out fresh cherries she had frozen last summer for winter pies. Sure, you can do that, but cherry pie is my personal favorite and grapes are cheaper and don't make people pies ... well they do make wine, if you are so inclined, but save the wine for yourself!

- unsalted peanuts in the shell and unsalted peanut butter

The birds prefer crunchy peanut butter.

- cracked corn

You can buy bags of this at Tractor Supply up by Kroger.

- unsalted popcorn

Day old popcorn that has softened holds together better.

- chunks of roasted potatoes, mild cheeses and fresh coconut

- dried seed heads from ornamental grasses or wild flowers such as black-eyed Susan, goldenrod, sunflower or mullein

- unsalted, no-sugar breakfast cereals like Cheerios and Chex

and of course the standard

- black oil sunflower seed, white proso millet seed, Nyjer seed and suet

Garlands

A needle and strong thread start a garland. Make red ones out of cranberries; white ones out of popcorn; alternate red and green grapes for festive color; string cereal O's with raisins and chunks of fresh cheese and roasted potato with fresh coconut; or mix them all up. Let the kids be creative!

Tinsel

Unsalted peanuts in the shell strung on 8-inch pieces of thread become imitation pinecones or natural tinsel. Grapes strung on similar thread look like dan-

gling pearls.

A variety of ornaments can fill in after the garland and tinsel.

Seed Clusters

Use a long piece of red yarn to tie bundles of dried seed grass and flower heads. The long ends tie the bundle to the tree with enough left over for a festive bow.

Pinecones

Gather all sizes of pinecones or buy some from a hobby/craft store. Tie red yarn around the top of the pinecone for a hanger and then spread each "petal" with unsalted peanut butter.

Baskets

Save the rind of orange halves eaten for breakfast to make little baskets or buy wicker "candy" baskets from the hobby/craft shop. These can sit on top of branches or hang from twigs with thread handles. Fill them and refill them when emptied with shredded cheese or loose birdseed. You can even fill the orange rinds with peanut butter. You'll be surprised how quickly it disappears! You may want to get a big bucket of peanut butter if you have a lot of woodpeckers, nut-hatches and chickadees.

Suet Balls

You can buy suet balls ready to hang or make them yourself from suet cakes or even from scratch. With suet cakes, soften them in the microwave just until pliable, not melted. Divide in half and form into balls. Cut some 5-inch squares from potato or onion bag mesh and wrap the square around the suet ball. Close securely with a twist tie and hang on the tree with colored yarn or ribbon. To make suet from scratch, melt rendered beef fat or bacon grease and mix in 50 percent black oil sunflower seed, 35 percent white millet and 15 percent cracked corn or add bits of dried fruit, sugar free granola, and a couple tablespoons of peanut butter. Pour to cool in an orange rind basket or in a paper-lined cupcake pan. Be sure to remove the paper before wrapping the "muffins" in the mesh

squares. Hang all suet balls high in the tree, out of reach of dogs! If you make a bunch of balls at one time, you can freeze the extras until needed to replace those the birds devour. Be warned, made-from-scratch suet melts in warm weather where store-bought does not. Hang homemade suet balls on the shaded side of the tree and bring them in to the refrigerator or freezer when the temperature gets above 45 degrees.

Apple Balls

Tie a colorful thin ribbon around the stem of an apple to use as a hanger then cut some wedges out of the apple. Let the kids eat the wedges! Fill the empty spaces with peanut butter and then toss in a bag with birdseed. Shake and then hang. Throw leftover seed on the ground under the tree.

Christmas Cookie Ornaments

These were my favorite to make. Buy one more loaf of bread than what you need for your turkey stuffing. The day before, after tearing the rest of the bread into pieces to dry for the turkey dressing, have the kids use shaped Christmas cookie cutters like stars and bells or gingerbread men to cut shapes out of slices of bread or use a wide-mouthed glass and a small glass to make circles or wreaths. A drinking straw is perfect for cutting a hole in the top of the bread "cookie" for hanging. Leave the bread out overnight to dry. The next day use a knife to spread peanut butter on both sides. Then use birdseed to decorate the cookies. Press a star in yellow cracked corn; a snowflake or angel in white millet; bells in black oil sunflower seed. Leave gingerbread men mostly plain with peanut butter, but add raisin buttons and cracked corn eyes. Let the kids be creative!

Mini Wreaths to hang can also be made out of a variety of ingredients.

Apple Rings

Apples sliced into rings are easy to hang with yarn. Spreading peanut butter on both sides of the slice is as tasty a treat for children as it is for the birds. If the kids don't eat all the rings first, have them press each peanut-buttered side onto a plate of birdseed for a cool effect. White millet makes white wreaths, cracked corn yellow, sunflower black, or mix the seeds for a multi-colored effect.

Cereal Bracelets

Cereal O's strung on a 5-inch piece of red yarn makes a circle when the ends are tied together. Attach it to the tree with a red yarn bow to imitate a wreath.

Donuts and Bagels

Stale donuts and bagel halves are also shaped like wreaths and easy to hang. Use them as carriers for the following. Mix some black oil sunflower seed, white millet, cornmeal and a little bacon grease into a bowl of unsalted crunchy peanut butter. Then press each side of the donut or bagel in the mixture to coat.

These are just a few ideas to get you started decorating a tree for the birds. Be creative! Throw any leftovers under the tree for the ground feeding birds. Let them clean up the mess!

Do you have a real greenery wreath on your front door? You can re-use it after the holidays by decorating it for the birds the same as you do a tree. Move it from the front door to a lamppost, mailbox post, fence post or even the bird feeder pole. Special brick hangers can attach it directly to the side of the house or garage next to a shrub. Attaching a wire to the back of a giant sunflower head allows it to be hung the same as a wreath. Even sunflower heads can be decorated with chunks of cheese or dried fruit. Possibilities abound! Whether you decorate a tree or a wreath for the birds, it is easy, fun and a real feel-good family project.

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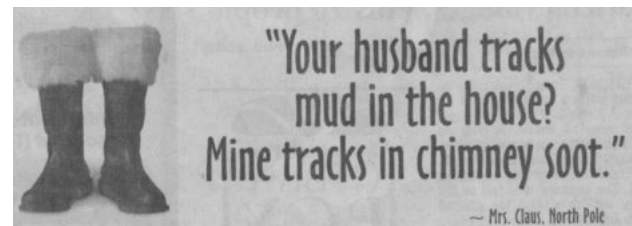
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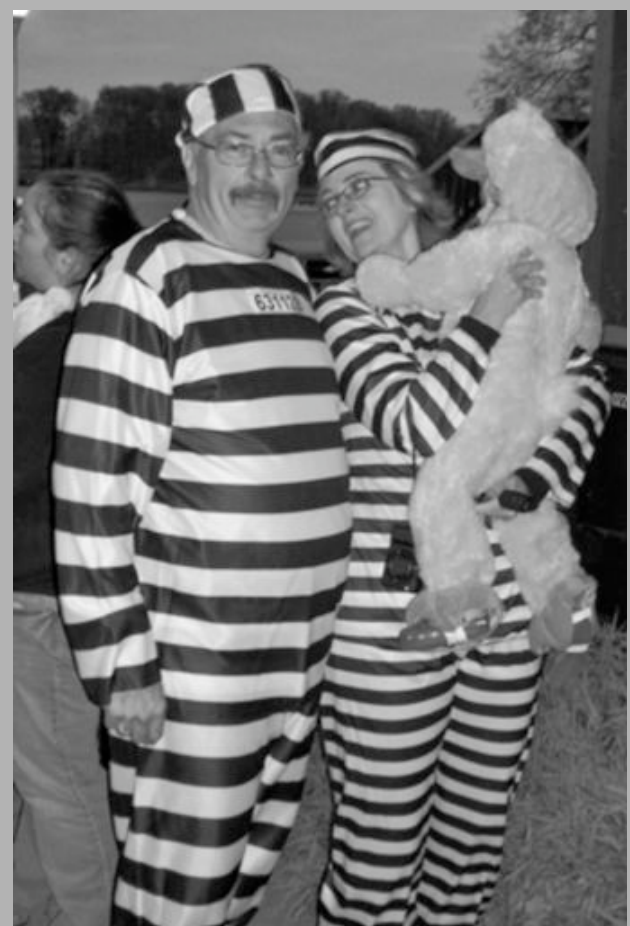

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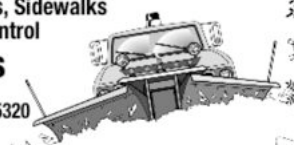
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
